Objectives and Investment Policy

Investment Objective:

The Fund aims to provide long term capital growth and income by investing in a portfolio of corporate bonds, while promoting Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) characteristics within the meaning of Article 8 of SFDR. The Fund aims to have a lower carbon intensity, calculated as a weighted average of the carbon intensities the Fund's investments, than the weighted average of the constituents of its reference benchmark.

The Fund promotes ESG characteristics within the meaning of Article 8 of SFDR. More information on HSBC Global Asset Management's responsible investing policies is available at www.assetmanagement.hsbc.com/about-us/responsible-investing.

Investment Policy:

In normal market conditions, the Fund will invest at least 80% in investment grade and non-investment grade bonds, and other similar securities issued by companies, based in developed markets and emerging markets.

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The Fund will invest a minimum of 80% of net assets in fixed income securities issued by issuers that are deemed to be on a clear and measurable path by meeting certain climate transition related criteria ("Climate Transition Criteria"). The purpose of the climate transition assessment is to determine an issuer's progress or commitment towards alignment with Net Zero pathways (i.e. the projected emissions allowed to an issuer through to 2050 to meet the Paris Agreement goal to limit the temperature increase to 1.5 degrees Celsius compared to pre-industrial levels).

The Investment Adviser aims to construct a portfolio which aims for a lower carbon intensity, calculated as a weighted average of the carbon intensities of the Fund's investments, than the weighted average of the constituents of the reference benchmark which has been designed to achieve net zero carbon emissions by 2050. Companies and/or issuers considered for inclusion within the Fund's portfolio will be subject to excluded activities in accordance with HSBC Asset Management's Responsible Investment Policies, which may change from time to time. Please refer to the Prospectus for further details on excluded activities.

Climate Transition Criteria, environmental and social factors, corporate governance practices and excluded activities and the need for ESG due diligence may be identified and analysed by using, but not exclusively, HSBC's Proprietary ESG Materiality Framework and scores, fundamental qualitative research and corporate engagement. The Fund may invest up to 10% of its assets in onshore Chinese bonds through the China Interbank Bond Market, up to 10% of its assets in non-investment grade bonds, up to 10% in asset backed securities (ABS) and mortgage-backed securities (MBS), up

to 10% in contingent convertible securities, up to 10% in other funds, and may invest in bank deposits and money market instruments for treasury purposes. The Fund may hold shares (and securities similar to shares) received as a result of or in connection with a corporate action affecting existing portfolio holdings. The Fund may also invest in derivatives for efficient portfolio management purposes,

hedging and investment purposes. Derivatives will not be used extensively for investment purposes. Derivatives will not be used extensively for investment purposes. Derivatives may also be embedded in other instruments used by the Fund.

- The Fund may enter into securities lending transactions for up to 29% of its assets.
 However, this is not expected to exceed 25%.
- Currency hedging is carried out in respect of the share class. The aim is to protect against exchange rate fluctuations between the share class currency GBP and the base currency of the Fund USD.
- The reference benchmark, shown in the past performance section, does not take account of currency hedging. There may be a greater difference between the past performance of the share class and the reference benchmark than for other share classes in the Fund.
- The Fund is actively managed and does not track a benchmark. The Fund has an internal or external target to a reference benchmark, ICE Global Corporate Climate Transition Index Hedged USD.
- The Investment Advisor will use its discretion to invest in securities not included in the reference benchmark based on active investment management strategies and specific investment opportunities. It is foreseen that a significant percentage of the Fund's investments will be components of the reference benchmark. However, their weightings may deviate materially from those of the reference benchmark.
- The deviation of the Fund's performance relative to the benchmark is also monitored, but not constrained, to a defined range.
- Income is reinvested.
- You may sell your investment on most working days.
- Recommendation: this Fund may not be appropriate for investors who plan to withdraw their money within a period of 5 years.
- This product is based overseas and is not subject to UK sustainable investment labelling and disclosure requirements.

Why is this Fund in this specific category?

Material risks not fully captured by the Risk and Reward Indicator:

- Callable Bond Risk Any unexpected behaviour in interest rates could negatively
 impact the performance of callable debt securities (securities whose issuers have the
 right to pay off the security's principal before the maturity date).
- CoCo Bond Risk Contingent convertible securities (CoCo bonds) are comparatively untested, their income payments may be cancelled or suspended, and they are more vulnerable to losses than equities and can be highly volatile.

- Counterparty Risk The possibility that the counterparty to a transaction may be unwilling or unable to meet its obligations.
- Credit Řísk A bond or money market security could lose value if the issuer's financial health deteriorates.
- Default Risk The issuers of certain bonds could become unwilling or unable to make payments on their bonds.

- Liquidity Risk Liquidity Risk is the risk that a Fund may encounter difficulties meeting its obligations in respect of financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or other financial assets, thereby compromising existing or remaining investors.
- Operational Risk Operational risks may subject the Fund to errors affecting transactions, valuation, accounting, and financial reporting, among other things.



Segregated liability

HSBC Global Investment Funds is an investment company ("Société d'Investissementà Capital Variable") with segregated liability between sub-funds under Luxembourg law. This means that the holdings of one sub-fund are kept separate from the holdings of the other sub-funds and your investment in the Fund cannot be used to pay the liabilities of any other sub-fund.

The Fund is authorised in the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg and supervised by the Commission de Surveillance du Secteur Financier (CSSF). This key investor information is accurate as at 20 June 2025.
